the Revolutionary war, that he the Clerk Shalton  
obtained in the regular service of the United States on the  
27<sup>th</sup> day of May 1776 in the 8<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment  
Commanded by Lt. Peter Willenburg for one year  
but for some cause or other was kept two years  
in said service, that he was in a short time  
after his enlistment attached to the 1<sup>st</sup> Virginia  
Regiment Commanded by Lt. Reed, that from  
all recollection in December 1776 he received a furlow  
and was absent from the army about two months,  
that he was in the battles of White Plains, Brandy  
Creek, Germantown, & Monmouth that he contin-

that he has now no other evidence of his said service  
in his power except the annexed affidavit, that  
he is in reduced circumstances and needs  
the assistance of his Country for support  
now in Hardy County Virginia, & travels to the County of  
Harrison to obtain the testimony of Mathias Litz, who was  
an officer in the Revolutionary Army of his services, and  
I certify that from the proofs exhibited to me by said  
Shalton, it appears to my satisfaction that he did serve  
in the Revolutionary Army as above set forth, and that he  
is now in reduced circumstances & stands in need of the assist-  
ance of his Country for support.

all which Regiments he believes were in the Continental  
establishment that he continued to serve in said Regi-  
ments and Corps until the day of July or August  
in the Year 1778 when he was discharged from the said  
Service in or near Bombay in the State of Jersey that he  
was in the battle of the Clouds at Brandywine  
with the troops driven from them by the Enemy in the battle  
of Brandywine in the battle of Germantown & in the

Chilcutt who was a soldier in the revolutionary war, and belonged  
to the Virginia line. for proof of his service she refers to papers  
now on file in the Pension office. that the said Elisha Chilcutt  
was a pensioner of the United States, on the Virginia agency, that he  
received a pension for about five or six years previous to his death;  
She further, <sup>deposes</sup> that she was married to the said Elisha Chilcutt, about  
fifty years ago, in the month of \* in the year of 1788 to the  
best of her belief and knowledge, that her husband the aforesaid  
Elisha Chilcutt died on the day of May 1831 that she was not  
married to him prior to his leaving the service but the marriage  
took place previous to the first of January one thousand seven hundred  
and thirty four, viz. at the time above stated Lydia <sup>his</sup> Chilcutt.

me. I certify that Lydia Chilcutt is not able to appear in Court in  
consequence of old age and bodily infirmity, I certify that the words in

The deposition of Rachel Wilson aged sixty nine years Testifies; that she was well acquainted with Elisha Chilcutt & Lydia Chilcutt his wife, she was well acquainted with them both, ~~from~~ when she was quite young, and she has a perfect recollection, that Lydia Chilcutt, then Lydia Payne, calling upon a sister of hers, to wait upon <sup>her</sup> when she was married, that the said sister did go for that purpose, and stated when she returned, that the said Elisha Chilcutt, and the said Lydia Payne was married, this deponent has every reason to believe and does believe that they were married; she has been well acquainted with them ever since, and they have lived together as man and wife, she states to the best of her knowledge and belief that the said Elisha Chilcutt and Lydia his wife has been married forty eight or fifty years, her memory will not permit her to state the exact year, she herself has a child forty four years old last June, and she knows that Lydia Chilcutt had several children, older than ~~some~~ hers, she further testifies that that the said Elisha Chilcutt has been dead several years leaving Lydia Chilcutt his widow, that she has never intermarried but still continues the widow of the above mentioned Elisha Chilcutt, the said Elisha Chilcutt died to the best of her recollection sometime between the 20<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup> May 1831

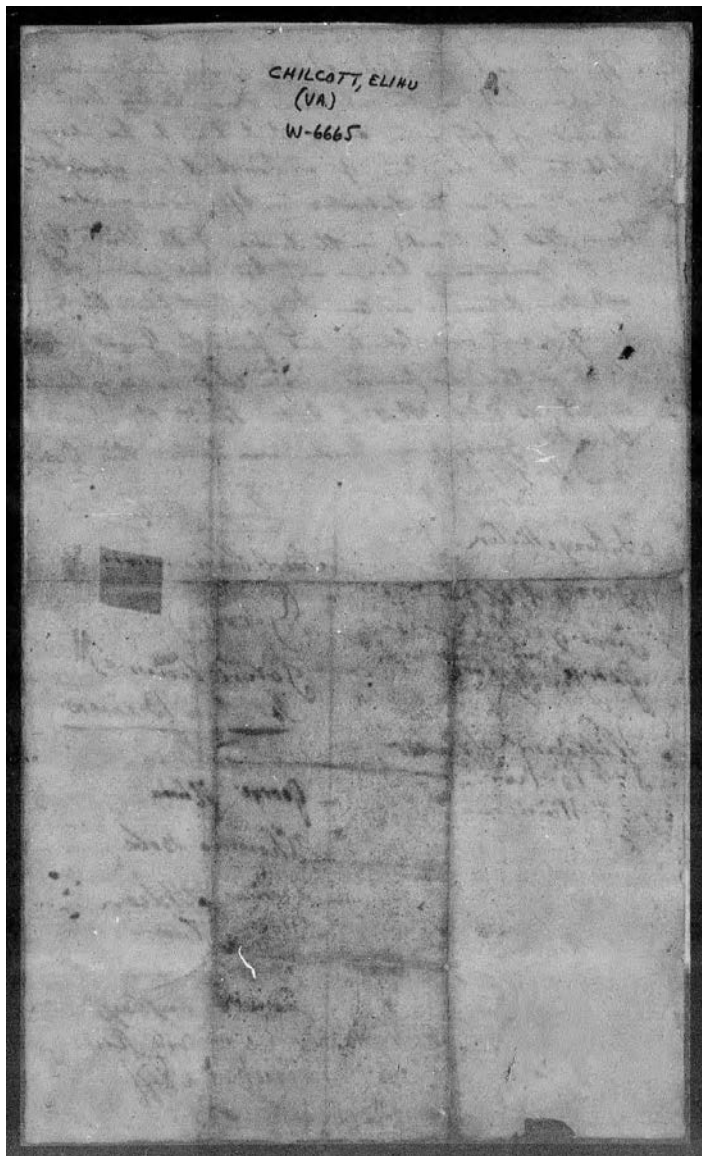

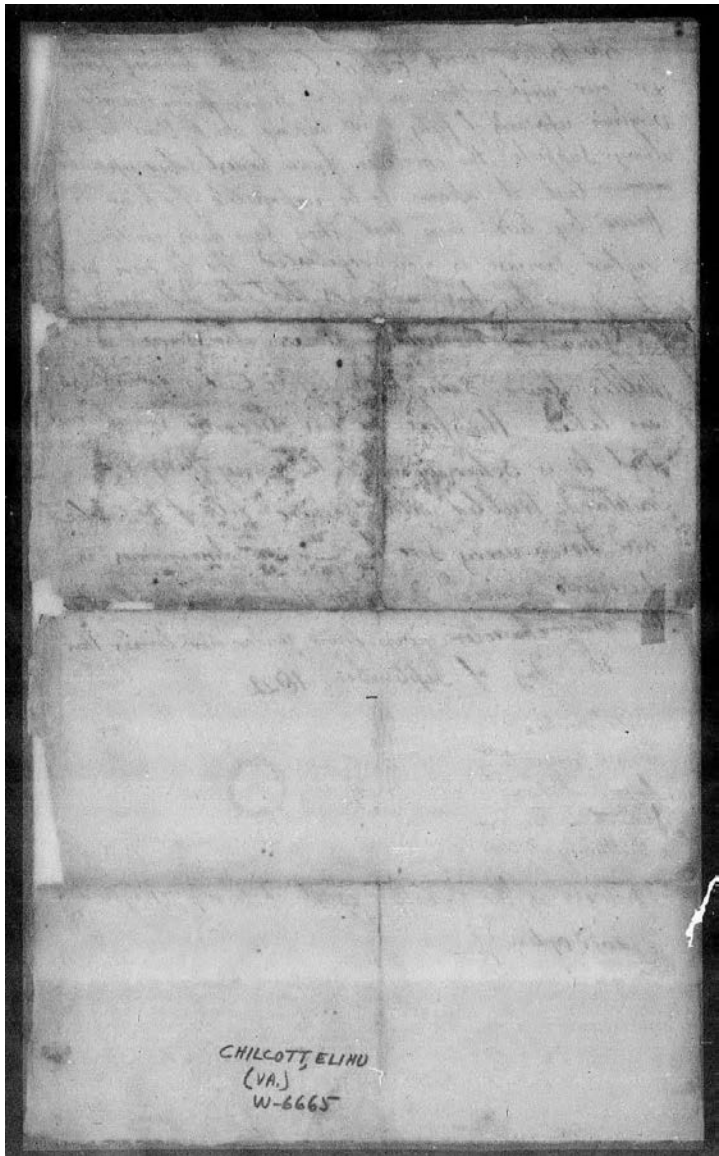

Dear Sir,

When ever you will receive the application  
of Ebenezer Chittick for a pension under the act of Cong  
-ress of the 18<sup>th</sup> March 1818 & 1<sup>st</sup> May 1820 with two  
-certificates of his age & of his Character circum-  
-stances &c. If I have been correctly informed and my  
-memory serves me the ostensible reason why he has  
-not obtained a pension was that his name was not  
-found among the rolls of the revolutionary soldiers  
-There are two circumstances which induce me on behalf  
-of Chittick to trouble you with his papers (which have  
-already been before the Secretary of War) and request  
-your attention to his claim. First my personal know-  
-ledge of his indigent circumstances which in that  
-respect entitles him to a pension as much perhaps  
-as any of the 18000 and upwards that are enrolled  
-And secondly from the circumstance of his name  
-being frequently called and spelt differently from  
-what it is in his papers, which induces me to con-  
-jecture that his name was otherwise enrolled. It  
-is not to hear his name called and see it written  
-by his neighbours <sup>Chittick</sup> Chitt instead of Ebenezer, and Selcott  
-instead of Chittick. It may be that when the rolls  
-were examined for his name (which I presume  
-are alphabetically recorded) that the names begin-  
-ning with the letter C only were examined, whereas  
-there is a probability of his name being enrolled  
-with those beginning with the letter S. I believe it  
-is not in the power of the old man to obtain any  
-other evidence of his right to a pension under the  
-existing laws; but if there should be any informa-  
-tion in the papers you will please to communicate  
-it. If you will procure me a good fat office under  
-the General Government I will be grateful for the  
-favour
